Abstract: The Isabella Stewart Gardner papers span 1492–1924 and are arranged into sixteen series that document the life, interests and work of the art collector, patron and philanthropist Isabella Stewart Gardner (1840-1924), who founded the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston in 1900.

Provenance:

Isabella Stewart Gardner's papers were left to the Museum Trustees in two distinct gifts. Papers situated within the first three floors of the Museum building at the time of Gardner's death, July 17, 1924, were left to the Trustees and are considered part of the Museum's accessioned collection.¹ Papers left in her private residence on the fourth floor were left to her executors and transferred to the Trustees in July of 1925, along with other items from her estate. Some papers in the collection have no known provenance, but they were likely acquired through one of these gifts. Arrangement and Processing Notes:

The arrangement of the papers has changed significantly over the years. Careful consideration was given by early caretakers to note the original order and to maintain associations between archival material and objects. Physical and intellectual control of materials was established in the archives by the creation of inventories and storage by material type in the early 1970s.

Isabella Stewart Gardner arranged the majority of her papers within the museum galleries. They were placed in display cases and tucked in drawers, containers, and books. Their presence in the galleries at the time of her death designates them as part of the museum collection, as described in her last will and testament.

Display cases were inventoried and partially transcribed in the mid 1920's and photographed in the early 1940's before being removed and packed during WWII (1941-1945). When the items returned, they were reinstalled in a different order. This era of case order was documented with hand-drawn layer maps and an alphanumeric code. Case codes were written on the verso of each item in preparation for microfilming by The Archives of American Art in 1972 and 1985. Materials from the display cases were gradually removed or rotated from the 1970s to the 1990s until only the original top layer of materials, or a curated alternate exhibition of materials, remained on view to the public. Items moved to the archives were stored by material type and arranged alphabetically by correspondent or subject. A checklist of correspondents was published in 1973 after the completion of microfilming by the Archives of American Art.

All remaining original materials from the display cases were moved to the archives between 2006 - 2019, and an arrangement of replicas based on the earliest known historic photograph for each case was created in the museum galleries.

From 1967 to 1972, photographs, ephemera, clippings, travel albums, and guest books previously arranged in the first floor Vatchino gallery were inventoried and moved to the archives. Photographs, ephemera were moved from the Macknight Room to the archives in the early 1960's – 1973. Collections were assembled during this period from groups of materials found in the adjacent Vatchino and Macknight Room galleries, for instance Series 7:2 Dealer photos. Book enclosures were removed from inside the books in museum galleries and also from Gardner's personal library stored in her fourth-floor apartment; all correspondence found in these locations was filed alphabetically in the correspondence files. Ephemera removed from display cases and other gallery locations was filed in research subject files.

During reprocessing for this Finding Aid, close attention was paid to the provenance of materials and Gardner's original bequest. The papers of John L. Gardner Jr., previously integrated with this collection, were described separately as the *John L. Gardner Jr. papers and collection*. Isabella Stewart Gardner's outgoing correspondence, autograph letters, books, photographs, and memorabilia, donated to the Museum after 1924, established the new collection, the *Collected Isabella Stewart Gardner materials*.

Due to the unique nature of the collection and its documented arrangement as well as the connection to the galleries and artworks in the museum, the papers have been described at the item level. Some groupings of materials remain intact in the orientation they were found in and are noted in the series or subseries notes. Legacy archival arrangement was preserved in series 1, series 7, and series 8:3, and 8:7. Materials in series including correspondence, dealer records, photographs and ephemera, travel albums, and guest books have titles devised by archivists or curators. Two series, Series 15, Architectural records and Series 16, Financial records, and one subseries, Series 8:10, Three portfolios of newspaper clippings, are not fully processed and are only partially described and are not digitized or are partially digitized. Preliminary inventories of these collections are available. Conservation treatments have been phased by priority, beginning with at-risk material first. Conservation treatment records are held by the Museum's Conservation Department and are closed to research. Information about specific conservation treatments may be shared at the discretion of the Director of Conservation and/or the Curator of Collections.

Biographical and Historical note:

Isabella Stewart Gardner (14 April 1840–17 July 1924) was an American art collector, patron, and philanthropist who founded Boston's Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum.

Born in 1840 to David and Adelia Stewart in New York City, Isabella Stewart Gardner was the eldest of four siblings. She was educated at private schools and by tutors in New York, Paris, and Italy. Isabella Stewart met John "Jack" Lowell Gardner Jr., the brother of a school friend, while their families were traveling abroad in Europe in the late 1850's. They married at Grace Church in New York on April 10, 1860.

The couple settled in Boston and took up residence at 152 Beacon Street, a house her father built as a wedding gift. In 1863, their son John L. Gardner, III "Jackie," was born. He passed away at the age of 21 months from pneumonia. They later adopted their nephews, the three orphaned sons of Joseph Peabody Gardner (1828–1875), Jack Gardner's brother, and Harriet Amory Gardner (1835–1865): Joseph Peabody Gardner, Jr. (1861–1886), William Amory Gardner (1863–1930), and Augustus Peabody Gardner (1865–1918).

In 1867, Isabella and Jack Gardner took their first extended trip abroad to Northern Europe and Russia. From this point on, the couple traveled extensively, including trips to Egypt, China, Japan, India, and Southeast Asia. The couple visited Venice every two years from 1884 until 1897. In Venice, they stayed at the Palazzo Barbaro, which would later influence the museum's design.

The late 1870s also saw Isabella Stewart Gardner making her first purchases of stained glass, Romanesque sculpture, and Medieval art as well as attending lectures in art history at Harvard by Professor Charles Eliot Norton. With Norton's guidance, Isabella began collecting rare books and manuscripts. During the 1880s, Gardner gained a reputation as a notable presence in Boston's art, music, and social scenes. She supported emerging artists, musicians, and other emerging artists by providing resources or performance space in her home. She rapidly befriended figures such as Henry James, John Singer Sargent, James McNeill Whistler, and Charles Martin Loeffler. In 1891, Gardner inherited 2.75 million dollars² after the death of her father and began to collect works by Old Masters such as Vermeer, Botticelli, Rembrandt, and Titian. With the guidance of art historian Bernard Berenson, her primary advisor and agent—as well as others—her collection of fine and decorative arts grew exponentially in the wake of her father's death.

As their art collection grew, Isabella and Jack Gardner began planning to build a museum. Shortly after Jack Gardner's death in December of 1898, Gardner purchased the first of a group of lots in the Fenway that would be the future site of the Museum in January 1899. Construction on the museum began in June of 1899, and on December 19, 1900, Isabella incorporated the Museum as the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in the Fenway, "established for the public education through the exhibition of artwork."

Isabella oversaw the design, construction, and installation of her museum, which she called Fenway Court and moved into the fourth-floor apartment on the top floor of the museum in 1901. Fenway Court opened to invited guests on January 1, 1903, and to the public in February 1903. Gardner continued to renovate the museum and rearrange the collection in response to new acquisitions, evolving curatorial ideas, and advice and input from her circle of advisors and friends until her death in 1924. Fenway Court hosted music and performances by local musicians from the Boston Symphony Orchestra, the Kneisel Quartet, and charity events for local organizations like the Saturday Evening Girls. The museum was also the site of performances and lectures by internationally recognized artists such as modern dancer Ruth St. Denis, soprano Dame Nellie Melba, playwright Lady Augusta Gregory and scholar and curator Okakura Kakuzo.

A stroke in late 1919 paralyzed Gardner, but she continued to correspond with friends, acquire art, and publish on her collection. *A Choice of Manuscripts and Bindings from the Library of Isabella Stewart Gardner* was published by Merrymount Press in 1922, with assistance from Morris Carter, who would later become the Museum's first director and biographer. After suffering a heart attack on July 8 of 1924, she passed away on July 17. Isabella Stewart Gardner is buried in the Gardner family tomb at Mount Auburn Cemetery in Cambridge, Massachusetts, with her husband and son.

In her will, Gardner left the museum in the hands of Director Morris Carter and the board of trustees, "for the education and enjoyment of the public forever," with the directive that no new acquisitions be added to the collection and that the arrangement of artworks in the galleries remain unchanged.

Scope and Contents:

The papers of Isabella Stewart Gardner (1840–1924) document her life as an art collector, patron, traveler, and museum founder. Her papers contain evidence of her education, travels, charity, patronage, and friendships. They include documentation for her art collection, the establishment and curation of her museum, and the personal and professional networks that contributed to the development and preservation of the museum. Gardner did not separate her personal and public work; however, biographical information pertaining to her marriage, child, and domestic life is noticeably absent. There are few materials covering her activities from 1860 to 1880.

Materials include correspondence, diaries, travel albums, guest books, photographs, receipts, shipping and customs documentation, lists, architectural drawings, financial and legal records that

date from 1850's-1924. Her papers also include family collections from her grandmothers and mother, and the Gardner family in addition to a collection of autograph letters, manuscripts and ephemera of other historical and cultural figures dating from 1492-1918.

Isabella Stewart Gardner stored, arranged, and even exhibited the majority of her papers within the museum's galleries. She added to and reworked how she presented these papers between 1903, when the museum opened, and her death in 1924. Gardner created thematic exhibitions of manuscripts, photographs, and ephemera in fifteen display cases in the Yellow Room, Blue Room and Long Gallery.

The papers are currently arranged in sixteen series, ten of which are further divided into subseries. Refer to the container lists for folder and item level descriptions.
